Official Correspondence

1. Dr. David Lassner, Interim Chancellor

President Dela Cruz Tonight we have with us Dr. David Lassner who is our Mānoa Chancellor and also our

UH President. He's here with us to present information regarding the Manoa

reorganization.

Dr. David Lassner Thank you! I printed out slides because I didn't know you had a projector. This is what

I'll be using at the open forum for the whole campus on Friday. I'll be changing this as I go, so if you have great ideas that would make this better before Friday, let me know. We started looking at the organization of the Mānoa Chancellor and Vice Chancellor offices last year. I did some brainstorming with a few people. We had an open forum and I got a million comments telling me everything that was wrong. I took that feedback and I asked this design team to get together. The work that you'll see here is the work of the design team. We also had another open forum and small meetings about different topics. Jannah and last year's Vice President were involved with quite a bit of it. As we went through each of these topic areas and talked about them, we had different groups of people in and

out of the room who had expertise in these areas. A lot of ideas came from these people on campus. Slide 2 really focuses on why we're bothering to reorganize and what we're trying to accomplish. These are the things we want to do. As we design the reorganization, we're trying to keep these things in mind. This is focused on the Chancellor and Vice Chancellor offices. It does not get into the guts of the individual colleges. We've been talking about whether TIM should merge with Shidler. This is not a topic for this reorganization. There have been talks about merging LLL, SPAS, and A&H. Those are separate things that are ongoing and independent of this. The purpose of this was not designed to save money, but we did want to be sure that we weren't spending any more. One of my observations that I've learned a lot while in this job is that nobody wants to be reorganized to save money, but I hope everyone can be inspired to be reorganized so that we can be better at what we do. Slide 3 just shows some redesign considerations and ground rules. I think the most important thing is that we're trying not to make this about the people and offices we have today. A lot of our observation is that we have grown things pretty willy-nilly, especially in the past 17 or so years since the last reorganization. Every time someone wants to do something, we have another office reporting to another Vice Chancellor. What we really made this about is what does the campus need to accomplish, what would be the best way to organize around it, and later on we'll figure out exactly who goes into it and how it links to the existing boxes that we have. We reviewed the current organization to make sure we capture everything that's in there, but we're not talking about "you go here" or "you go there." Once we start doing that, everyone starts to have an opinion that is grounded in themselves and we want to make this about the campus. On the next slide, I included an example to show that this really has been evolving. This is the version that I've pitched to the entire campus just a little under a year ago and it does not look anything like what I'm proposing today. You can see that it is substantially different. We have been evolving as we go. Slide 5 is the proposed reorganization. We tried to avoid hierarchy because people take it pretty personally if they feel like what they do got demoted. Starting in the center, you see the President. This is proposing to merge the UH system President and the Manoa Chancellor. Both of which I've been doing. I've been President for about 5 years and Chancellor for about 2 years. That is captured in here. The other most important change is the creation of the Provost, which is right in the center. The Provost at most research universities is the Chief Academic Officer and is responsible for all of the academic functions. This kind of lays it out. The green boxes are things that are Manoa only. The green and gold are boxes that have function for both Mānoa and the UH system. The things with the gold outline are part of the President's Cabinet of the University of Hawaii system. Something I did want to highlight is that the Provost would actually be joining the President's Cabinet to be sure that there is an independent Manoa only voice. The next page goes into what some of these new things are. The Provost is the Chief Academic Officers, as I've mentioned. This is the person who has to get up in the morning and the only thing they have to think about is the success of the faculty and students at UH Mānoa. We tried to put under this person all of those things and not give that person anything that might distract them. We would have all the schools and colleges report to the Provost, right now they report to 3 different places. The Provost would have budget decision authority for all academic units. Within that office would also be the Office of Global Engagement. You can see the tag lines and what we want the office to really focus on. We tried to be more strategic. The next one is the Vice Provost for Educational Excellence. This is the group that is responsible for program reviews, accreditation, assessment, and all things that relate to the programs. We also want to strengthen the programs for students. Study abroad is one example and we have lots of ways for students to take a semester or year away from campus. We want everyone who comes here to have the opportunity to spend some time away, especially for local students so that they can broaden their educational horizons without having to go away

and paying non-resident tuition. There is also a transfer program. At every graduation, more than half the students walking across the stage started at other school. That's how important transfer students are to UH Mānoa. We need to do more to help them. The other part here is all of the faculty related activities. This includes all the hiring, tenure, promotion, and other things that relate to having our faculty be successful. Slide 8 show the Vice Provost for Research, Scholarship, and Graduate Studies. We want this person to focus on research across all of the academic units. This also includes what we're calling Graduate Student Success, which I'm talking to GSO about. Grad division used to be part of Academic Affairs and Research. The consensus with this is that it would be a better fit with Research because most graduate students are doing research and are focused on their dissertation. The next is Vice Provost for Student Success. The key idea here is that we're taking the parts of Student Affairs that focus on student growth and development and the parts of Academic Affairs that are focused on student success and we're putting them together with this Vice Provost. This would be someone who gets up every morning and focuses on the academic and personal success of our students. On the next slide is the Vice Provost for Enrollment Management. This has been a huge challenge for all of our UH campuses. When I started as President of the system, UH Mānoa had 5 years of declining enrollment. Each year had a bigger decline than the year before. That's really bad. This Fall was the first time since 2012 that enrollment is actually up. We need people focusing on this. There's a science to enrollment management that we are just getting up to speed with. We also have to do better with retention. What are some of your recruitment strategies?

Senator Ramirez Dr. David Lassner

We have a couple of things we've been doing differently. One is is that we've been doing stronger outreach to the high school counselors. We're doing ads on the radio. We have slots with Michael W. Perry on the radio, which is the most listened to radio. Part of that is we want to influence parents to support their kids in coming to UH Mānoa. Some of it is direct recruitment. We also hired a firm that does this nationally. We're really trying to follow the best practices from other universities. If you have ideas, that would be awesome. We're also doing a lot of work with alumni groups on the mainland. We also need to get more Hawaii high school graduates to college. Kids who don't go to college at all are really limiting their future. If we get more people to get college, we'll have a lot more students at UH. This is one of the big changes. This reinstates the President as the Mānoa Chancellor or CEO. These are the units that would report to the President. There are summaries of each units that would report to the President. The Chief Business Officer is the money person. This new thing is called Equity, Climate and Conflict Resolution. This is a hybrid office that is part of both Mānoa and the UH system. At the UH system we have an Equal Employment Opportunity/Affirmative Action Office that supports both Mānoa and the UH system. We have an office of Institutional Equity, which is the Title IX office for the system. At Manoa we have an office of Civil Rights that reports to the Chancellor, an office of Gender Equity that reports to the Chancellor, a Title IX office that reports to the Chancellor, and a Women's Center that reports to Student Affairs. What we want to do is create a high-performance unit. We want to split them into 2 functions. One is focused on education, training, and advocacy. The other is the formal processes of complaints, which are subject to strict laws, federal rules, and UH policies. If a faculty who is a woman of color has an incident with a male faculty member, this could be a civil rights problem, it could be a gender equity problem, it could be a Title IX problem, so all of these things right now go to different places. We're going to try and bring it all together. This is something that was actually brought up by students and that is the creation of an ombudsperson. The idea of an ombudsperson is to provide a safe and formal place to go with complaints and try to have it resolved privately and confidentially. These are the 2 system Vice Presidents who have substantial Manoa responsibilities. Now into the recombination of the Manoa Chancellor and system President. This is the reason for the recommendation of the change. This is something

that did not come from me. I'm not actually looking to make my job twice as hard. When we were working with the design team, it was actually the Faculty Senate Chair from last year who said we should just recombine the system President and Chancellor. This page has the theory of why it hasn't worked. If you turn to the next page, you can see data that I've pulled together. The Chancellor's position, historically, for the first 65 years of the University, there was no such thing as a separate Mānoa Chancellor. It was just the UH President who led the Mānoa campus and other parts of the UH system. In 1972, they created a separate Chancellor position. You can see over the next 14 years that we went through 6 different Chancellors. It was not stable. Then the 2 things were combined under President Simone in 1984. We had 16-17 years of pretty good stability with just 2 people who held 2 jobs. They separated the position again in 2001. Since then we've gone through 7 Chancellors. The average in the US is 6.5 years for a President/Chancellor. We have never made average. Regardless of the causes, this has just never worked. There's this saying, "The definition of insanity is doing the same thing over and over again and hoping for a different result." That seems to me what we've been doing with this position. It has never worked. On slide 15 is us just trying to learn from the lessons of the past. In particular, I was around during the separation in 2001 and I've heard all of the arguments, so I said, "How can we address the problems people were complaining about in 2000?" Slide 17 has the Cabinets and the advisory groups. You can see what are the leadership groups and the strategic projects we would have. You can see that this is where we have the advisory groups like the Faculty Senate and ASUH. Slide 18 discusses the key objectives from slide 2. Slide 19 has both the Mānoa and UH system positions together. Here you can see the Manoa boxes I've shown you earlier and how they fit together with other contacts for the UH system with all of the other Vice Presidents. You can see the Manoa Provost would be an equal to the West Oahu Chancellor, the Hilo Chancellor, and so forth. Slide 20 has the next steps. I'm gathering all the input I can on this version of it. I do plan to bring this with whatever changes from this consultation to the Board of Regents this month. I will ask them to approve it in concept. If they approve of this, we still have to refine this and determine who goes exactly where and so forth. We want the Board of Regents to approve of this concept so that when we produce all the details, we're doing it for a reorganization that conceptually people had put input into. I'm being optimistic and hoping we can have this implemented by July 2019. On the last slide is a quote that I love, "Everybody can agree that something has to be done. The hard part is agreeing on what that is." I have some FAQ. I'm happy to answer questions about this and since I'm rarely here, I'm happy to answer questions about anything.

I see the implementation will take place in July 2019. How will the orientation program for undergrad students be looked into?

I have been really annoying about New Student Orientation. People got really mad at me. I said people shouldn't have to pay for New Student Orientation because we want our students to be successful and I also said it shouldn't be in the summer because it is not really friendly for those who are from somewhere else. I got push back, but I'm also told that it worked pretty well. In terms of who does it, right now we have that moved over to Student Academic Success from Student Life because we want it to be a holistic introduction to students about both their student life and their academic life on this campus.

Have you been looking at other models that other universities have been doing? I have not, but I got the advice from people who have been looking into it. I was involved in this past NSO as a senior leader. I think change is good in many

aspects. It would be very positive if there were effective programs.

Earlier in the summer, President Trump's administration seems to have made a stance on affirmative action. How does this affect the University?

This administration has made it a point to go back on a lot of things that were done in the Obama administration. On affirmative action, they are supporting this case at Harvard.

This is an attempt to roll back the affirmative action protection that have been provided up until now, which has been upheld by the Supreme Court. The good news for Manoa is we actually accept all qualified applicants. At Harvard, let's say they get 80,000 applicants for 2,000 seats. We take all of our people. We're race blind. We just look at qualification. This doesn't really impact us at the undergraduate level.

It's funny because Hawaii actually compares itself to places like California, but

California has actually banned affirmative action in their schools. I think there are other models of affirmative action in Europe. Instead of manipulating admissions, they provide resources before students apply.

This comes back to my comment about having more Hawaii public school students go to college. We have to do more at that level and we have to do more in the community

colleges to have more students transfer to other universities.

I want to know how the Vice Provost for Research will affect programs like UROP or SAL Negrillo INBRE. If we're looking at the system, are there going to be changes at the community

colleges as well?

Treasurer Honda

Dr. David Lassner

Dr. David Lassner The Vice Provost for Research will have a focus on Mānoa. UROP will be under that

> office. Right now we have 2 or 3 INBREs. One in JABSOM and we have an INBRE in PBRC. The Vice Provost for Research will work with all of the departments and ask if anyone has an INBRE idea and will help select which is the strongest one and help support it so that it's funded. Mānoa colleges sometimes collaborate with the community colleges, so this Vice Provost will help facilitate that. The community colleges does have their own research activities that they run themselves. A lot of times, they reach out. For example, the community colleges have pre-engineering programs and sometimes they'll

reach out to our engineering program.

SAL Li I have a question regarding the history of the combination and separation. Thank you for

providing this graphic. I see that this isn't the first time the position was combined. Back in 2001, the position was separated. Could you give reason as to why the position was

separated?

Dr. David Lassner The Manoa faculty felt that with the combined position, they didn't have their own

> leader. You would think that the other schools would complain because the President would've had more loyalty to Mānoa, but it was Mānoa faculty that complained. I talked to Mānoa faculty about this. Their committee on Administration and Budget supports the recombination now. We wanted to address those concerns, but still keep the positions combined. The most important thing is the new Manoa Provost position. We did not have

this before.

SAL Li During the separation and recombination, was there ever any big reorganization?

Dr. David Lassner Nobody has tried to do the whole thing at one time like this. This time we really tried to

think about what each office will do.

President Dela Cruz Just for clarity, you mentioned you will seek approval of the conceptual proposal versus

the fleshed out details. Will you be presenting this?

These slides are what I will literally be presenting. Dr. David Lassner

Senator Ramirez There's no processes you folks do that are similar to the affirmative action lawsuit? Dr. David Lassner Yes, that's correct. We do nothing like what Harvard is being sued for. We're race blind.

We want more people to come here.

Are you working on creating ombuds right now? VP Simeona

If this passes the Board this month, we will start right away creating that. Dr. David Lassner VP Simeona What if other programs are going to overlap what the ombuds will be doing?

Dr. David Lassner I think there is some clarity with what that will look like. The ombuds is the first place

you can go to try and get help and try to resolve something.

Since you are presenting this at the November meeting, is there time for some of these President Dela Cruz

things to change before you present it?

Dr. David Lassner Yes. I'm taking notes. As you ask me questions, I'm taking note of what needs to be explained more. This presentation will freeze probably at the middle of next week.

President Dela Cruz Since this is the first time for most of us to see all of these details, would you be open to

receiving more input from us within the next few days?

Dr. David Lassner Absolutely. If you want to talk about it after I leave, you can send me comments and

suggestions. If you could get me input by Tuesday, that would be great.

Undergraduate Academic Affairs
