Guest - Dr. Ethan Caldwell, Ethnic Studies Department & Advisor of BSA

Dr. Caldwell

Thank you for having me. I would like to hear from y'all. A lot of what I have been noticing is that a lot of folks have not had a space to talk. Can I take a few minutes to let you guys talk about what has been going on in the last few weeks?

President Albano

Would anyone like to share?

Senator Seals

From my understanding, I'm pretty sure we have all heard of the injustice that took place concerning George Floyd. The video is what is making everyone upset. You can clearly see that somebody- the cops that were involved. The cops really went too far. You can see that George was telling them that he couldn't breathe and he was calling out to his mom. It was really hard to see injustice happen. Due to that, we could see a lot of eye-opening. It was not the first time. So a lot of people are finally trying to see. We already had that, but with this being so clear this time to see somebody. I feel like everyone is like this is it. If these people don't get charged, we are at a loss here. If they don't get charged, then that's it. I have family around the world, I have family in Atlanta and everyone knows that if something doesn't happen this time, we have a problem.

Dr. Caldwell

Thank you, I want to hold my responses until the end so I can conceptualize it more with a larger focus. Y'all can feel free to share

Senator Heslia

I just want to say it is really heartbreaking to watch everything that's going on. I stand in solidarity with these folks, African-Americans. We have people doing these lives every day to give people these nuggets of information. The biggest thing I got out of this was to stop and listen to the deep-rooted issues going on right now. So I stand in solidarity with you folks. And don't always believe the media. That's all I have to say.

Senator Vogt

I want to start off by saying most of my family is based in California and I am not there right now. I am watching my family stand out there and Sacramento has had a lot of issues with our police department. It cuts really close to home with the community we come from. And I was talking with my friend the other day and he said we were out there knowing that the cops that killed countless others were there or participating in that. It's been really frustrating to see that systemic change takes other people's lives. Physical presence is a difficult thing to do. We are separated from our communities. It is hard especially because we are in quarantine, it is hard to know what to do. Traditional routes or favorite routes have been physical presence. It's cool to see the creative thinking and what it's driven home.

Dr. Caldwell

Thank you, I'm from Vallejo so the Bay area connection right there. I know a lot of people struggle with thinking how it is still relevant here. How do these structures still exist? I think for me a lot of this has been me looking at what has been going on this last week with the disdain to say it's happening again. I am always telling my students that I am trying to remain hopeful that I don't have to talk about someone getting murdered by the cops. Sadly ever since I started teaching at a Professorial level, that has happened. But this has shown us that as we mourn those who have passed to ask what makes this so prevalent? And also if the view of how we are seeing these deaths change? Are we bearing witness? Then does that force us to then call because morally we are in a bankrupt sort of space. And also how this connects back to this legacy that connects to all of it. It goes beyond anti-Blackness, we are talking about the difference between the individual and the systemic level. Looking at racism, colonialism, imperialism, and more. They are all working as a whole in terms of how we're treating people and how we're treating land, and also what kind of importance people are putting on property. Where do we put the priority? There is a meme that is coming up and Michael Vic has served more time in operations than a majority of cops that have been charged or even been accused. That's a sobering stat because in the longterm a majority of this continues to occur, year after year. And this is only what is reported. So I kind of what I wanted to talk about is that this legacy of state-sanctioned violence, which is racism. A lot of that comes from what Beverly Tatum talks about. It exists in a way that's similar to vog or smog in the air. For example, as she says in her book why do all the Black kids sit together in the cafeteria because sometimes it's so thick it's visible, other times it's less apparent but always day in day out, we breathe in it. But if we live in an environment where we are bombarded with these stereotypical images in the media, we are frequently exposed to ethnic jokes of friends and family, and are not exposed to the accomplishments of those in ethnic groups, then we are going to develop or form the basis of prejudice. Part of why I'm saying this is because this legacy of state violence is not only at the systemic level but we can see it within our own homes, amongst our friends, amongst our family members, and even in our communities. As much as the cops, specifically those involved with George Floyd have been arrested, part of what I'm trying to implore your way is to not let it end here. What about the rest of it? It has different levels. One of you mentioned that protesting isn't the only way. We all have different ways to engage. Not all of us are going to be on the front lines, some of us will be policy makers. Some of that engagement needs to come from our own circles. We have to be willing to address it amongst our loved ones and trust me those can be some of the hardest conversations to have especially with family. One can imagine the amount of anti-Blackness might exist in your own home. But also thinking about ways to not only educate yourself but also others. What kind of resources can you get hold of. Whether its listening to Angela Davis speak on YouTube or reading PDFs online. Furthermore also how do you show allyship or support. It could be you amplifying different voices and the end of the day that. Here in Hawaii we need to address these issues. It was only a couple of years ago that a Black nurse at Queen's Medical Center found a noose in her locker. This legacy of racism and anti-Blackness and colonialism and more is over 400 years in the making. One event is not going to change it, but sustained engagement will. So as you continue your work, think about the BSA and reach out to us, reach out to ethnic studies student association. Identify those community members because I think at the end of the day, yes we are talking about Black Lives Matter but also know that

everyone's liberation is interconnected. So I want to continue to give you all space to share or respond.

Senator Keim

I just want to say thank you so much for speaking on this. This is a really hard time right now so I appreciate your time.

Dr. Caldwell

Thank you for giving me the space to do so, also part of the way we can engage is by acknowledging our emotions. We tend to think that protests are one dimensional but I try to encourage y'all to think creatively and think what else can I do. As a professorial side besides community based action we are always trying to figure out what that additional engagement looks like. That's why I continue to share with y'all because I think that y'all in many ways are positioned to do so many different things to help support, so thank you.

Senator Chua

Thank you for sharing with us and giving us a space to talk. I wanted to ask from a professor's standpoint. What are the most effective ways to apply what we learn at a scholarly level to apply to an activism level? Especially with a big University like UH.

Dr. Caldwell

I think part of it is me being here is a form of activism. Part of the longer studies of Black Studies, I think there are only *eight Black faculty on campus, but what I think becomes crucial is understanding that as students, you guys have power and a say and a certain kind of voice. Part of it when I mentioned coalition today, this is where that academic kind of grounding the language comes into play. Whether it's looking at who can help me achieve these goals and also what is a tangible thing that we can do on campus that can help address and get to social justice roots. I think part of this is taking an expansive approach but also identifying a tangible approach that you can build upon in years to come in order to keep the movement going. This is where this coalition building, this is where funding comes to play. I'm not sure if that answered it fully, but I can send Donavan some resources that can help out with that.

Senator Regaspi

As ASUH, as we move forward to put out a statement to address some of these things, what do you think are some of the biggest things we should address in the statement?

Dr. Caldwell

I think a lot should focus around solidarity through social justice through an Oceanic lens and also showing that like I mentioned earlier, these protests are part of a long legacy of colonial and racial violence. Part of it is finding a way to frame what you are discussing. No matter what you state, be steadfast in it. Be steadfast in the support. Be clear what it is you are addressing like police brutality because police brutality is only part of it. Like who has access to food, and how this plays out with COVID. I think a lot of this needs to be kept in mind as you stand as a collective body.

President Albano

Some great questions! Does anyone else have something they want to share? Dr. E, thank you so so much for your time so we could have this very much needed conversation. We are so grateful for you being able to share your insight both on an academic level but also just being able to share your insight on everything, so thank you so so much.

Dr. Caldwell

Thanks to y'all for providing me the space. But can I just say should y'all

need any resources feel free to contact me. Please feel free to email me. The other thing is don't be afraid to be brave. I think that is always tricky. Because taking the first step is the hardest. You are in a room here with people who are willing to make something happen. Treasure that because it is rare to have. I encourage you all to strive to do what you can as best as you can, and I appreciate y'all.

President Albano

Thank you so much this was super insightful. I can't thank you enough for your time.

Dr. Caldwell

No problem! I'll see you folks another time. If you need anything, feel free to message me.

President Albano

I hope that was helpful to start to kick start this discussion regarding this statement and I hope that inspires you to think critically about where we are, the positions we have, and our individual actions.

Black Lives Matter

President Albano

Okay as I sent out an email last night. I think it is important that we take the time to have a statement as ASUH to stand in solidarity. Articulating how we as the undergraduate student government would like to take action or recommend any action. This is an important conversation that needs to be had. I'm sure that everyone is aware that there continues to be this fight. As Doctor E mentioned, everyone's liberation is highly interconnected with this fight. Something I want to highlight that Dr. E said that this is not a recent phenomenon. This is a fight that has been going on for centuries and it is interconnected with issues that affect all aspects of our lives. Kind of talking about how colonial racism is very ever-present which is something that I'm really hoping we can articulate. So what I'm thinking is that we can start working on the official statement and any recommendations that you may have. Regarding the statement we can jot down points, then following this we can have a group hash out and write out the statement. So we can really sit as soon as possible because this is a timely issue. Would anyone like to share what they think is important to add into the statement?

Senator Kim

With the statement I feel like we need to include that we are an institution that serves indigenous people. Exactly what Doctor E said, this fight is not just for Black people it is for everyone that has the same oppressor. On another note, I think it is important that we take fast action regarding the protests on Friday and Saturday. They are expecting around 5000 people to attend. They have worked things out with HPD so they can isolate and locate people who are rumored to come here to start violent actions. All of that is planned out. From a safety perspective, it is as safe and as peaceful possible. I was wondering that in addition to the statement, we go there in person as ASUH. I will be going there as an individual senator as well and I will share the sign-up link for volunteering.

SAL Williams

I would like to agree with Senator Kim, my main issue with our statement is that I really want to see that we address the violence that has been happening across

the country. Most of the protests here have been violence-free, so I would like to see that we put a comment to the statement that we condemn any violence and we are supportive of peaceful protesting but we should go against violence because it hijacks the message of the movement and goes against what we're trying to solve here. That's my main concern and I yield back.

Senator Kim

I have a question regarding the condemning of violence. I do agree that there are some forms of unnecessary violence. But if you look at the history of civil activism, and the action that rioting conveys, rioting is a form of catharsis for those who have been unjustly pushed down and oppressed by a force that they couldn't combat through traditional means like legislation. These are actions that happen when people are fed up with the system because they can't find progress through it. So I agree we should disavow violence that isn't exactly necessary. Yes, Senator Vogt sent in a thing, perfect yes.

Senator Vogt

"If we are to include that, I'd say it be that we disavow violence that is unproductive to change. Violence for violence's sake is different than violence for the sake of change"

SAL Kaeo

I agree that we should clarify in our statement that we aren't for violence. That is something we should really clarify about.

Senator Seals

Something that Dr. E brought up is that there is a real small Black community at our school. I go to a lot of his, he's the head of BSA, and I've gone there a few times as well and it is a really small community. There are a lot of people who don't know about it, but I definitely think that we should talk about it. and show that we do have a community on campus and express unity. I remember that they put it in one of the UH booklets about the diversity on campus and that there is a 2.1% or something like that of the Black community in the school. I know that's kind of small, but I think that should be the big thing in the statement, unity, and that 2.1% or I don't know however big it is that that is a part of UH whether we like it or not and we support each other. It's like unity so I really think we should express that as well.

Senator Kim

Bouncing off of that is there any way we have ethnic group associations sign off on this like the BSA, LGBTQ+, and so on?

President Albano

Thank you for sharing that. If that's feasible, I think that would be an amazing thing if we were able to do that.

Senator Vogt

I think it would be powerful if ASUH made an independent statement as well. I also wanted to touch on what Senator Seals said, recognizing that we represent the undergraduate students at UH, we can also recognize that the UH community is bigger than its undergraduate students. I feel like the official percentage representation may not seem big, but it goes beyond the numbers that get reported for undergraduate enrollment. Also, I think for the framework of the statement, I think it would serve us well that we denounce racism in all forms and all forms of injustice. We should also speak about what happens locally because we are well-positioned to talk about that.

Advisor Manini

I think that I just want to be sure that you're clear that the best way for ASUH to write a statement is for ASUH to write and pass a resolution and then the

President creates a statement based off of that resolution. That is usually how ASUH operates in terms of taking positions on issues and so that's what I would recommend. In terms of coalition-building, there is the opportunity for drafters of a resolution to be in consultation with other groups of students in the RIOs that you guys are mentioning or grass-root organizations. And or once you pass what you have, you can ask those groups to endorse it as part of what they support as well. There are definitely different ways you can do it. You can include them in consultation when you are drafting or ask them to endorse it when it's passed.

Senator Vogt

President Albano, do you want to explain the resolution process?

President Albano

A resolution is basically a piece of resolution that outlines ASUH's particular stances on issues. I can pull out an example of what that looks like. This allows ASUH to take a particular stance on an issue. Whether it's condemning an action or supporting one, etc. I have put in comments about what the statements mean.

Senator Kim

If anyone wants experience writing a resolution, I will be writing one that basically says the United States is suppressing peoples' rights to protest, so hit me up after and we will get working on that. I will explain all the specifics.

Treasurer Oshiro

I just wanted to let everyone know if you wanted to look at examples of past resolutions to get more context on what it is. I believe for the past five senates, you can go on our website and read past resolutions. I think if we pass this resolution it will stand indefinitely unless it goes recalled or repealed in any way.

Senator Hesia

I just wanted to make sure that in the resolution we are speaking directly to our Black counter folk, and that we are really emphasizing that. While yes it is important to mention all the other things, I think it should be at the heart of the resolution that we stand in solidarity and that it is blatantly clear.

Senator Garrett

I second what Senator Hesia said.

Advisor Manini

I just want to kind of build upon what Treasurer Oshiro said, no matter what the topic is, it is really important that with resolutions you guys think it through carefully and it's well written as well as that it reflects what the 108 Senate wants to say. Also to say on behalf of ASUH because a 108-year organization will still be here in another 100 years and you want it to reflect the best of what you are and show that you thought about it clearly. I just want to reiterate what the issue is. This one obviously hits to the heart of who we are as a University as a community, as part of Hawaii. We don't condone racism, I mean a majority of us don't condone racism. I know people are going to be passionate about this one, so be sure that you think it through and make the statements in the resolution to say what you really want it to say on behalf of this organization. I just want to re-emphasize that.

President Albano

Yes, I think it's important that we think critically about the rhetoric of the resolution and also what kind of future senates will be kind of thinking about and the work that we've paved for that.

Senator Chua

Thank you all for sharing such powerful thoughts and opinions. I think we

should definitely work together on a resolution, and I was wondering what you all thought about starting a working group to write this specific resolution in solidarity. I know that Senator Kim mentioned that they were going to write a resolution on brutality and stuff like that, so if Senator Kim would want to be part of this resolution group as well that would cool. So I was wondering, President Albano what you thought and if anyone wants to join that working group.

President Albano

Yes, thank you, Senator Chua. I was thinking that this would be the most effective way in the interest of time if we had a working group work on this specific resolution.

Senator Kim

I would absolutely love that, and I just want to clarify it does not have to be just one resolution either. I think that including racial elements of this is very important as well, but as a working group, we can work on multiple resolutions regarding the situation and what issues we want to be pushed through. To help ameliorate this issue because there are lots of layers to this issue. I am looking forward to working with everyone on this.

Senator Garrett

Thank you, Senator Kim, for chiming in about the different levels of resolutions we can do. In my opinion, I think the first one will set precedent for the resolutions if we do send out multiple, and how our message comes across. I do believe that the first resolution should hit the keynote. I do feel to emphasize what Senator Hesia has said our first priority should be to show solidarity not saying that the issue of police brutality is not important, but showing solidarity to that however many support the undergraduate first. That should be first, so I just wanted to say that.

Senator Hokama-Paris

Ae' wai puna hou ke aloha kakou. Kind of going off previous senators were saying. I really want to highlight what Senator Garrett just said, after we talk about the standing in solidarity as a University entity, I would like to highlight that if we look back, O' ke ka hua a mua ma hope ke akua, the foundation, if we look back at our people in the Kingdom era there were ili kea, or white skin, ili ula, or brown skin, and ili ko or nekelo, the Black skin. I would like to highlight in our statement, through the lens of kanaka or the lens of the indigenous we didn't see color, we saw a pilina between the people. I would like to mainly focus that if we set a foundation forward from the fact that if we look through the perspective of our ancestors this is he mea pono ia, this is needed. I hope I made that clear.

President Albano

Thank you Senator Hokama-Paris, I would just like to echo what he just mentioned. I think it is important that we think really critically about the spaces that we inhabit and in this time that we think critically about where we want to go and what has also happened in history. We have been talking extensively about this for a long history that sometimes I think we are not educated enough. I hope we can really think about where we are and how this is connected to the continent. Thank you for sharing that mana'o.

Treasurer Oshiro

When we are organizing this group. Is there going to be a when to meet or something sent out? How is this going to work?

President Albano

I think for something like this it is kind of a timely issue. I'm not sure if you all

would like to schedule a time to do this right now or we can send out a when to meet. I think it is really important if we could work on this as soon as possible. The sooner the better.

Senator Vogt

I just wanted to highlight that Senator Chua has offered to send out a when to meet.

Senator Chua

Thank you Senator Vogt, I totally agree with President Albano that this is an extremely timely issue. If possible I can send out a when to meet tonight for tomorrow so folks can choose, so the working group can gather tomorrow. I'm open to comments from anyone. Any questions or comments for Senator Chua?

Senator Garrett

Because there was an option for talking about this later on, will we take names now? How does that go? Having some direction would be great

Senator Chua

What I would kind of suggest is doing a poll thing. So those who want to work on this, I will send these specific groups when to meet.

President Albano

If you would like to be part of this resolution, please raise your hand now.

Senator Chua

States the names of those who want to be involved.

Senator Garrett

I just wanted to clarify, so when the resolution is completed it has to come back to the Senate, it has to come back to the Senate and we will read through it and decide how it goes. We don't only have the only say. That is correct right? It has to be approved by the Senate as a whole

President Albano

Yes, so once this resolution has been drafted and been sent through eventually it will come back to the general senate.

Senator Garrett

I just wanted to share that so those who are not in this committee and want a say in the final project. You will have a say in the final resolution.

Senator Kim

Are we making an ad-hoc committee or is it an unofficially a committee of people.

President Albano

I think for now this can just be a working group or session. If the Senate feels it's necessary to create an ad-hoc committee, then we can do so.

President Albano

Alright does anyone else have anything to add regarding this resolution or working group? Alright if not the last part that I'd like to discuss is what specific actions you all would like ASUH to take in this matter in these issues.

Senator Kim

I'm in talks with the organizers for the Black Lives Matter protest this Saturday and Sunday. If anyone wants to join the Slack, let me know. I will also send an email to the Senate with a link on how you can be involved, and just a reminder they have talked with HPD. HPD is involved with this and they are making sure that people who are planning on making the event violent, don't do that.

Senator Basim

I think it would be really good if we could provide resources for other ways for people to be involved and also resources for mental health because I know that a lot of people are growing through a rough time, this must be really difficult, so if

we could provide resources for that as well that would be really great.

President Albano

I know on our website we have resources for COVID 19, I think that could be something that we could definitely do. We could reach out to the external affairs committee and see what they can do and if they are open to sharing any resources on whichever platform regarding mental health and educational resources as well.

Senator Lee

I was just wondering if we were able to utilize the ASUH Instagram and Facebook before then?

Advisor Manini

You can use social media to get input, but you shouldn't use it to promote any type of position until the Senate has taken a specific position.

Senator Kim

One other thing was that now UAA Chairperson Bowersmith and I were talking about working on a cross committee on getting part of an African American studies course to become a graduation requirement. If anyone wants to get involved with that, I will send out an email with information on that.

V. OPEN FORUM

Senator Garrett

In recent weeks, Senator Heslia and I have been working together. Title 9 the rules, rights and responsibilities are being changed at a very high level.
